Approval of Minutes

MOTION: Mr. Beal moved to postpone approval of the minutes *Postponement* of the April 17, 2013, meeting until the next meeting.

The motion passed.

Reports

Membership Mr. Helmuth reported that Town Moderator John

Leone is seeking a Town Meeting member to fill the

vacancy on the Committee left by Raymond

Charbonneau III's resignation.

Bid or Proposal

Request

He said that Town Manager Adam Chapdelaine would

like the Committee to consult with Town Chief Technology Officer David Good and other affected

offices in town government to formulate a request for bids or proposals for the rental of an electronic voting

system for use at Annual Town Meeting 2013.

One early decision, he said, will be whether to request

bids or proposals.

He said that bids are often used to identify the least-

cost product or service that meets minimum

specifications, while requests for proposals are more formal and allow for an assessment of competing

proposals that is more qualitative.

Mr. Helmuth reported that the Town Manager suggests issuing the request for bids or proposals in September.

He distributed the first draft of a list of tasks related to implementing and procuring equipment for electronic voting at Town Meeting. A copy of this document is appended to these minutes.

Finance

He noted that the capital-planning process will begin in August. The Town Manager will meet with the chairs of the Finance and Capital Planning Committees to discuss how to proceed.

DISCUSSION: *Implementation*

Subsequent discussion touched on the interests to different Town departments, lessons to be learned from other towns, planning for the roll-out and immediate review of implementation, and the role of volunteers.

Some Committee members suggested that other Town departments, including the schools, might want to use the electronic-voting equipment for other purposes than voting, with implications for the financing and life of the equipment.

New Business

DISCUSSION: Close Votes Bylaw

Mr. Auster told Committee members that a provision in the new bylaw governing the use of electronic voting, which required a visual review for close votes, is flawed, as described in a memo that he distributed at the meeting.

A copy of this memo is appended to these minutes.

He said that the bylaw relies on the margin of difference between yea and nay votes to trigger the review.

For supermajorities, he said, the margin of victory of the prevailing side may diverge profoundly from the margin of difference, so the bylaw as written would not work as intended. Mr. Auster said that the Committee should sponsor an amendment that would preserve the original intent of scrutinizing close votes, but redefine the test to apply to all majorities.

Special

He said that the Committee should agree on the language for this change over the summer, so that a Town Meeting

special Town Meeting, if one is called for other purposes, could act on the amendment in the fall.

Mr. Beal moved that the meeting adjourn. MOTION:

The Town's new voting bylaw includes the following provision governing close votes by electronic tally:

In an instance where the difference between the yes and no votes according to an electronic tally is less than 6 votes, then the individual votes shall be displayed.

To see the problem with this, ask yourself how it would apply to a vote requiring a two-thirds majority to pass.

The language we included assumes a simple majority, which is not always the required vote. Below is a provision that seeks a similar result but written to be majority-neutral (so as to apply to any majority requirement).

The individual votes shall always be displayed if the prevailing side of an electronic tally is within 3 votes of smallest number needed to prevail.

This will require the Moderator to determine the "smallest number needed to prevail" for close votes, and use that as the basis for applying this bylaw. (On the other hand a similar calculation is required to determine the supermajority threshold anyway).

Is there a majority-neutral way to word this that is easier to calculate?

We should resolve this by the fall so that if there is a special Town Meeting we can bring it there for action. Otherwise it can wait until the spring.
