Arlington Recycling Committee Minutes of 12/4/14

PRESENT Co-Chair Juli Brazile; Co-Chair Gordon Jamieson, Recycling Coordinator Charlotte Milan, Ellen Callaway, Karen Einstein, Secretary Pete Howard

MINUTES of 11/6/14 voted approved as printed. Unanimous

COORDINATOR'S REPORT: Charlotte discussed her monthly report (Ref 1). She is exploring making an arrangement with a kitchen waste hauler/recycler that residents could sign up for and would pay for. Group discussed the concept that the DPW (perhaps with ARC funding) provide small kitchen top containers as a 'reward' for those that purchase third-party kitchen waste collection services

In 2012 the Board of Selectmen was supportive of the idea of achieving a 50% diversion rate, although no one present could remember how specific was their support and whether a vote was taken. Members will research between now and the next meeting. The committee discussed whether to advocate a target date to reach this goal. It would be desirable to know how much would be gained by complete compliance with the current trash/recycling regulations. Metrics include the number of 'violation' stickers issued (for more than 3 barrels or no recycling present) that are handed out each week. Also the number of related phone calls to DPW. Charlotte's audits should provide more info as well. Members believe that at least reducing the maximum numbers of barrels from 3 to 2 or 1 may be required to meet the goal. A kitchen waste program may also be needed. Juli will invite DPW Director to the Feb ARC meeting to discuss this issue.

UPDATES

Business Recycling: Juli reported that the license form that was sent from DoH to haulers contained several questions about recycling (Ref 3). We hope that the responses, when compared to the responses from business to the CoC survey will provide a basis for a campaign to increase business recycling.

FinCom Presentation: The ARC may be asked to justify its budget. If requested, it will probably be in early Feb. Gordon will prepare a handout with an expenditure summary & budget together with a history of diversion in Arlington & the initiatives that DPW & ARC are carrying out. This handout will be reviewed at the Jan meeting.

COMMUNITY COLLECTION DAY 11/15: The collection was successful with much more foam and a huge amount of rigid plastic. We processed the contents of 578 cars. Charlotte donated the income from shredding to the Food Pantry. She presented a revised traffic & booth layout for May 9 (Ref 2). This plan addresses various bottlenecks we experienced last month. To be successful it needs many more volunteers, perhaps 8 per shift. Members discussed this issue. Perhaps some training would help - see below.

SPRING EVENTS

Jan TBD Tour of the new JRM recycling facility called Greenworks in Peabody. This will be by invitation with open tours in the spring.

Jan 31 (tentative) Training for volunteer recruiting. Sponsored by Sustainable Arlington (and Vision 2020 overall) and facilitated by True Story Theater.

Mar 7 EcoFest (energy theme) Several suggestions were made for ARC booth. Dramatize the energy savings represented by tons of trash diversion. Make a display that could be reused in other venues. Include a roulette wheel. Quantize quantities by using animals.

Apr 16 Art Show Reception. Art should be hung much earlier in March before EcoFest. Ellen is trading off high quality print paper vs recyclable print paper. A bartender will be required (\$\$) if we want wine & beer.





DPW RC Action Priorities - update

- 1. Increase curbside monitoring of program compliance: resume in December
- 2. Build on public space recycling opportunities/programs: **starting open space** waste working group over winter
- 3. Improve compliance and appearance of waste collection on Mass Ave, including business compliance with orange bag program
- 4. Continue public outreach through media and website publication:
- 5. Monitor school building compliance with mandatory recycling
- 6. Explore new programs for waste diversion, including rigid plastics, bulkies, food waste, HHW expanded operations, and potential regional CHARM (Center for Hard to Recycle Material): **rigid plastic collecion at CCD a success, will run again in May 2015**,
- 7. Monitor dumpsters on Town program
- 8. Organics awareness: **Bishop School compost program going well, Dallin School compost pilot program proposed for spring launch, exploring private compost collection pilot program for spring 2015**
