MINUTES of 4/13/09 and 5/6/09 accepted as corrected. Unanimous

SCHOOL BUDGET: Bodie, using a handout supported by information provided earlier through the SubCom walked the FinCom through the budget as approved by the School Committee on 4/14. After using the December Town revenue allocation and taking all revenue including Federal stimulus funds into account (\$45.2m) and totaling salary commitments and expenses (\$46.5m) there remained a \$1.3m deficit. The Superintendent then decided to count on savings from bringing SPED students in house, charging certain foreign students and adjusting custodial overtime charges to bring the deficit to \$503k. Bodie with her admin team then identified 16 reductions that would balance the budget. The School Committee has yet to vote on these items. Subsequently State Aid reductions have reduced the allocation to schools of Town revenue to \$36.9m which will require further reductions. Some of these have also been identified in the Tier 1 & 2 listing. FinCom members asked many questions. Bodie, supported by the School Committee members answered. Some results included a deeper discussion of SPED issues; no effort to plan for FY11; a METCO analysis has been done & copies were promised the FinCom; no progress on consolidation of Town & School functions; stimulus funds will require additional reporting.

TOWN BUDGET: Sullivan, using an information packet provided at the meeting and, by email, the day before, walked the FinCom through a revised 5 yr plan. The plan shows a 2% spending increase for the schools and a 0.89% increase for the Town. It assumes no COLAs in FY10 and a 10.25% health insurance increase. All changes were relative to the FY09 budget w/ 9c cuts. This plan assumes the House Ways & Means budget w/ Quinn Bill funding restored. \$2,742,376 of the Override Stabilization Fund would be used. Sullivan is still negotiating for joining GIC or a private plan equivalent to GIC. Galkowski reviewed 34 reductions from the budget provided in January totaling \$842k. She also provided new pages for the budget book. Again members asked many questions The revised budget includes W&S offsets based on a new study of the support provided by Town departments. Most vacant positions are still carried in this budget. Police have submitted a COPS grant request to fund 4 patrolmen for 3 yrs. This would free some funds to increase the school allotment. No change in min manning of fire service.

VOTES: The FinCom voted almost all the budgets as recommended by Galkowski. See the table below. The ZBA, Selectman, Health & Human Services, Youth Services budgets were tabled to allow some investigation by the subcommittees. Ferrara to provide an appendix & a footnote to explain the change in W&S offsets. The FY09 budget as voted last year will be provided for reference in the report.

W&S EF: Ferrara presented a detailed analysis of this fund with a careful account of the indirect expenses based on the recent. study. The budget is based on the 2/2 MWRA prelim charges. He said the remote reading water meter project has been revived. The DPW now has quotes. He warned that rates will increase at 6% a year because of the cost of borrowing for the harbor & aqueduct system. He recommended that the Town be allowed to retain earnings as it sees fit.

ADJUSTMENT OF BUDGET FIGURES IN REPORT: Because of the hurried nature of the process this year, the Chair is authorized to correct any errors found in the votes up to \$25000 administratively. Unanimous.

COMMITTEE: Meetings before Town Meeting will complete the budget votes. All members asked to carefully review draft reports & report errors to Jones.
